Important Days

Indian Navy Day

Significance: This day is celebrated to commemorate the launch of Operation Trident by the Indian Navy on December 4, 1971, during the Indo-Pakistani War. The operation was a successful attack on the Pakistani Naval Headquarters in Karachi, marking a decisive victory and showcasing the Navy's strategic capability.

Purpose: To honor the achievements, sacrifices, and role of the Indian Navy in securing the nation's maritime borders.

Birth Anniversaries – Indian Personalities

R. Venkataraman: (1910): 4 December 1910 – 27 January 2009), also known as R. Venkataraman, was an Indian lawyer, independence activist and politician who served as a union minister and as the vice president of India and president of India. Venkataraman was born in Rajamadam village in Tanjore district, Madras Presidency. He

studied law and practised in the Madras High Court and the Supreme Court of India. In his youth, he was an activist for the Indian independence movement, and he participated in the Quit India Movement. He was appointed as the member of the Constituent Assembly and the provisional cabinet. He was elected to the Lok Sabha four times and served as Union Finance Minister and Defence Minister. In 1984, he was elected as the vice president of India and in 1987, he became the president of India and served from 1987 to 1992. He also served as a state minister under K. Kamaraj and M. Bhaktavatsalam.



Inder Kumar Gujral (1919): (4 December 1919 – 30 November 2012) was an Indian diplomat, politician, and anti-colonial independence activist, who served as prime minister of India from April 1997 to March 1998. Born in Punjab, he was influenced by nationalistic ideas as a student, and joined the All India Students Federation and the Communist Party of India. He was imprisoned for taking part in the Quit India movement. After independence, he joined the Indian National Congress party in 1964, and became a Member of Parliament in the Rajya Sabha. He was the Minister of Information and Broadcasting during the emergency. In 1976, he was appointed as the Ambassador of India to the Soviet Union. In 1996, he became the Minister of External Affairs in the Deve Gowda ministry, and developed the Gujral doctrine during this period. He was appointed the prime minister of India in 1997. His tenure lasted for less than a year.



Ramesh Chandra Majumdar (1888): 4 December 1888 – 11 February 1980) was an Indian historian and professor known for promoting Hindu nationalist views. He principally studied the history of India. Coming from a Baidya family, Majumdar was born in Khandarpara, Gopalganj, Bengal Presidency, British India (now in Bangladesh) on 4 December 1888, to Haladhara Majumdar and Bidhumukhi. He studied in various schools in Dhaka and Calcutta (now Kolkata) and finally, in 1905, he passed his Entrance Examination from Ravenshaw College, Cuttack. In 1907, he passed F.A. with a first-class scholarship from Surendranath College and joined Presidency College, Calcutta.

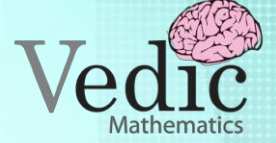

Death Anniversaries – Indian Personalities

Shashi Kapoor (2017): 18 March 1938 – 4 December 2017) was an Indian actor and producer known primarily for his work in Hindi films. He is considered as one of the greatest actors in the history of Hindi cinema, and is a recipient of several accolades, including four National Film Awards and two Filmfare Awards. The Government of India honoured him with the Padma Bhushan in 2011, and the Dadasaheb Phalke Award in 2014, for his contribution to Indian cinema. Born into the Kapoor family, he was the third and the youngest son of Prithviraj Kapoor. He began his career as a child actor in 1948 with his brother Raj Kapoor's maiden directorial Aag, and had his first role as an adult in 1961 with Yash Chopra's political drama Dharmputra. He established himself in 1965 with two blockbusters - Waqt and Jab Jab Phool Khile. This was followed by a period of further success, with Kanyadaan, Sharmilee and Aa Gale Lag Jaa.



The operation resulted in the sinking of a Pakistani destroyer (PNS *Khaibar*), a minesweeper (PNS *Muhafiz*), a cargo vessel carrying ammunition (MV *Venus Challenger*), and the destruction of oil storage tanks at the Karachi port.

It was a resounding success for India, with zero casualties or damage to the Indian task group, and a severe blow to Pakistan's naval capabilities and morale.

This decisive victory in the war at sea was crucial in the larger context of the 1971 conflict, which led to the creation of Bangladesh.

Other Notable Events

1829: Abolition of Sati (Partial Context) On December 4, 1829, the British Governor-General Lord William Bentinck issued a regulation declaring the practice of Sati (the ritual burning of a widow on her husband's funeral pyre) illegal and punishable in the Bengal Presidency. This was a major social reform in British India, though the date primarily marks the legal decree.

1959: Gandak Project Agreement: An agreement was signed between India and Nepal for the Gandak Irrigation and Power Project, a joint venture to harness the waters of the Gandak River for irrigation and hydroelectric power generation.

Historical event for India

Operation Trident (December 4, 1971)

Event: Operation Trident was a daring offensive launched by the Indian Navy on the Karachi Harbour, the main hub of the Pakistan Navy's fleet and maritime trade.

Significance: It was the first use of anti-ship missiles in combat in the region. The Indian Navy's strike group, which included three *Vidyut*-class missile boats (*INS Nipat*, *INS Nirghat*, and *INS Veer*), successfully targeted the Pakistani naval assets.

International Observances

International Day of Banks

Designation: Declared by the United Nations General Assembly.

Purpose: Recognizes the significant potential of multilateral development banks and other international financial institutions in financing sustainable development and acknowledges the vital role of the banking systems in Member States in contributing to the realization of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

World Wildlife Conservation Day

Focus: Aims to raise awareness about the global crisis of wildlife trafficking (poaching and illegal trade) and the necessity of protecting endangered species and their habitats.



Related Observance: Often celebrated alongside International Cheetah Day (also December 4th) to highlight the plight of this vulnerable species.

International Day Against Unilateral Coercive Measures

Designation: Observed by the United Nations.

Purpose: To raise awareness of the negative impact of unilateral coercive measures (like sanctions or blockades) on human rights and international law, particularly concerning the sovereignty and self-determination of nations.

Birth Anniversaries – International Personalities

Jay-Z (1969): American rapper, record producer, and businessman.

Jeff Bridges (1949): American actor and musician.

Thomas Carlyle (1795): Scottish philosopher, satirical writer, and historian.

Death Anniversaries – International Personalities

Frank Zappa (1993): American singer-songwriter, multi-instrumentalist, composer, and bandleader.

Hannah Arendt (1975): German-American philosopher and political theorist.

Benjamin Britten (1976): English composer, conductor, and pianist.

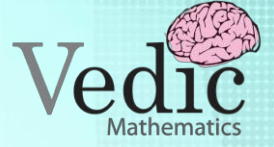

Political and Societal Changes

1829: Abolition of Sati in British India

The British Governor-General of India, Lord William Bentinck, issued a regulation that declared the practice of Sati (the ritual of a Hindu widow immolating herself on her deceased husband's funeral pyre) illegal in the Bengal Presidency. This was a major step in social reform.

1918: Proclamation of the Kingdom of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes

Following the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire after World War I, the Kingdom of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes was formally proclaimed, which would later be renamed the Kingdom of Yugoslavia in 1929. This marked a key moment in the formation of the modern Balkan states.

1982: China Adopts its Current Constitution

The Constitution of the People's Republic of China (the fourth and current version) was adopted by the National People's Congress.

Conflicts and Military Events

1676: Battle of Lund (Scanian War)

The Battle of Lund in Sweden took place between the armies of Denmark and Sweden. It is considered one of the bloodiest battles in Scandinavian history, resulting in a Swedish victory.

1808: Surrender of Madrid (Napoleonic Wars)

The city of Madrid surrendered to French Emperor Napoleon I after a four-day siege.

1971: Indo-Pakistani War (Operation Trident)

The Indian Navy launched Operation Trident against the Pakistani Naval Headquarters in Karachi, an operation that is commemorated annually as Indian Navy Day. This is considered a decisive victory for India in the 1971 war.

1992: US Troops Sent to Somalia

U.S. President George H.W. Bush ordered 28,000 U.S. troops into Somalia as part of a U.N. humanitarian effort, Operation Restore Hope, during the Somali Civil War.

Science and Culture

1791: First Sunday Newspaper Published

The Observer, a British newspaper, published its first edition, becoming the first Sunday newspaper in the world.

1943: Second Cairo Conference (World War II)

U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, and Turkish President İsmet İnönü met in Cairo to discuss Turkey's possible role in the war and to reaffirm the previous agreements regarding the war in the Far East.

1980: Led Zeppelin Disbands

The influential British rock band Led Zeppelin announced their breakup following the death of drummer John Bonham in September of that year.

1991: Pan Am Ceases Operations

Pan American World Airways (Pan Am), once the largest international airline in the United States, officially ceased operations due to financial difficulties.

1996: Mars Pathfinder Launch

NASA launched the Mars Pathfinder unmanned space vehicle from Cape Canaveral, Florida, which would eventually deploy the Sojourner rover on the surface of Mars in 1997.

Sports-related Historical Events in India

The IX Asian Games officially concluded on December 4th, 1982, in New Delhi. This was a landmark event for India, being the second time the country hosted the Asiad (after 1951). The games showcased new infrastructure and a strong performance from the host nation, which placed 5th on the medal table.

Sports-related Historical Events Internationally

American Football (NFL) Records

December 4th has been a significant date for rookie rushing records in the NFL:

1977: Tony Dorsett's 200-Yard Game

Dallas Cowboys legend and rookie Tony Dorsett rushed for 206 yards in a victory over the Philadelphia Eagles, becoming only the third rookie in NFL history at the time to rush for 200 yards in a single game.

1997: Corey Dillon Breaks the Rookie Rushing Record

Exactly 20 years later, Cincinnati Bengals rookie Corey Dillon broke the rookie single-game rushing record by racking up 246 yards in a victory against the Tennessee Oilers. This record surpassed the 40-year-old mark set by the legendary Jim Brown.

Basketball (NBA) Clutch Moments

2009: Kobe Bryant's Iconic Buzzer-Beater

Los Angeles Lakers superstar Kobe Bryant hit an unforgettable, leaning, fadeaway, buzzer-beating jump shot over Dwyane Wade to give the Lakers a dramatic 108-107 victory over the Miami Heat. This is widely regarded as one of his most iconic clutch shots.

2017: Steph Curry's 3-Point Milestone

Golden State Warriors point guard Stephen Curry became the fastest player in NBA history to reach 2,000 career 3-pointers made, achieving the milestone in

only 597 games. This shattered the previous record held by Ray Allen (824 games) and further cemented Curry's revolutionary impact on the game.

Ice Hockey

1909: Founding of the Montreal Canadiens

The Montreal Canadiens ice hockey club, one of the most storied and successful franchises in the history of the sport, was founded on this date as a charter member of the National Hockey Association (NHA), the predecessor of the NHL.
