Birth Anniversaries of Notable Indian Personalities

Mangal Pandey (1827): A key figure in the Indian Rebellion of 1857, considered one of the first freedom fighters.

Significant historical events in India

1969: Nationalization of Major Banks: On July 19, 1969, the Indian government, under Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, nationalized 14 major private commercial banks. This was a landmark decision aimed at giving the government greater control over the financial sector to achieve social and economic objectives, such as promoting agricultural growth and supporting small industries. A second round of nationalization, involving seven more banks, occurred in 1980.

1763: Battle of Katwa: While not as widely known as some other battles, on July 19, 1763, the British East India Company forces defeated Mir Qasim, the Nawab of Bengal, in the Battle of Katwa (now in West Bengal). This was part of a series of conflicts that eventually led to the consolidation of British power in Bengal.

1974: Remains of Udham Singh brought to India: The remains of revolutionary Udham Singh, who assassinated Michael O'Dwyer (the former Lieutenant Governor of Punjab responsible for the Jallianwala Bagh massacre) in London, were brought back to India from London on July 19, 1974.

Edgar Degas (1834): A renowned French Impressionist artist.

Samuel Colt (1814): American inventor and industrialist, founder of the Colt's Manufacturing Company.

Brian May (1947): English musician, songwriter, and astrophysicist, best known as the lead guitarist of the rock band Queen.

Benedict Cumberbatch (1976): English actor known for his roles in "Sherlock," "Doctor Strange," and "The Imitation Game."

Howard Schultz (1953): American businessman, former CEO of Starbucks.

Anthony Edwards (1962): American actor, known for his role as Dr. Mark Greene on "ER."

Vikki Carr (1941): American singer.

Jared Padalecki (1982): American actor, known for "Supernatural" and "Gilmore Girls."

Kristen Bell (1980): American actress, known for "Frozen" and "The Good Place."

Mary Boleyn (1543): Sister of Anne Boleyn, known for her relationships with King Henry VIII of England and King Francis I of France.

Petrarch (1374): Italian scholar and poet, often called the "Father of Humanism."

Aung San (1947): Burmese nationalist leader and the country's first Prime Minister, assassinated on this day.

Major International Historical Events

1969: Apollo 11 Orbits the Moon: On this day, the Apollo 11 mission, carrying astronauts Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin, and Michael Collins, successfully orbited the Moon. This was a critical step leading up to the historic Moon landing the very next day, a pivotal moment in human exploration.

1980: Moscow Summer Olympics Opens Amidst Boycott: The Summer Olympics opened in Moscow, Soviet Union, but were significantly impacted by a boycott involving approximately 60 countries. This boycott was a protest against the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan in 1979 and remains the largest boycott in Olympic history.

1870: Franco-Prussian War Begins: French Emperor Napoleon III declared war on Prussia, marking the start of the Franco-Prussian War. This conflict ultimately led to the unification of Germany under Prussian leadership and had profound impacts on the political landscape of Europe.

1848: Seneca Falls Convention (Women's Rights): In Seneca Falls, New York, the first women's rights convention in the United States began. This two-day event brought together hundreds of women and men to discuss and demand equal rights for women, including the right to vote, marking a crucial moment in the global women's suffrage movement.

1947: Assassination of Aung San: Aung San, a prominent Burmese nationalist leader and the country's first Prime Minister, was assassinated in

Rangoon (now Yangon, Myanmar). His death was a major blow to Burma's independence movement.

1553: Lady Jane Grey Deposed: After a mere nine days on the throne, Lady Jane Grey was deposed as Queen of England, making way for Mary I to ascend to the crown. This event is a dramatic chapter in English history.

1588: Spanish Armada Sighted: During the Anglo-Spanish War, the Spanish Armada was sighted in the English Channel, initiating one of the most famous naval confrontations in history.

1900: Paris Métro Opens: The first line of the Paris Métro, one of the world's most iconic subway systems, opened for operation.

1903: First Tour de France Concludes: Maurice Garin won the inaugural Tour de France, a cycling race that has since become one of the most prestigious and grueling sporting events globally.

1943: Allied Bombing of Rome: During World War II, over 500 Allied aircraft heavily bombed Rome, primarily targeting railway yards, in an effort to weaken Italy's resolve.

1980: Moscow Summer Olympics Opens Amidst Boycott: This is a hugely significant sports event on July 19th.
