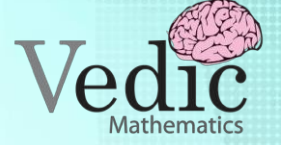

Important Days

Jammu and Kashmir Black Day: This day is commemorated to highlight Pakistan's role in the 1947 Kashmir conflict, which India terms as an invasion.

Birth Anniversaries – Indian Personalities

Ashfaqulla Khan (1900–1927): Ashfaqulla Khan (22 October 1900 – 19 December 1927) was a freedom fighter and martyr in the Indian independence movement against British rule and the co-founder of the Hindustan Republican Association, later to become the Hindustan Socialist Republican Association. Khan was born in the Shahjahanpur district of the United Provinces to Pathan landlord parents, Shafiq Ullah Khan and Mazharunissa. He was the youngest among his five siblings. In 1918, while Khan was in the seventh standard, police raided his school and arrested the student Rajaram Bhartiya with regard to the Mainpuri Conspiracy, in which activists organised looting in Mainpuri to fund the publication of anti-colonial literature. The arrest spurred Khan's engagement in revolutionary activities in the United Provinces.



Swami Ramatirtha (1873–1906): Swami Rama Tirtha (22 October 1873 – 17 October 1906), also known as Ram Soami, was an Indian teacher of the Hindu philosophy of Vedanta. He was among the first notable teachers of Hinduism to lecture in the United States, travelling there in 1902, preceded by Swami Vivekananda in 1893 and followed by Paramahansa Yogananda in 1920. During his American tours Swami Rama Tirtha spoke frequently on the concept of "practical Vedanta" and education of



Indian youth. He proposed bringing young Indians to American universities and helped establish scholarships for Indian students.

Tribhuvandas Kishibhai Patel (1903–1994): Tribhuvandas Kishibhai Patel (22 October 1903 - 3 June



1994) was an Indian independence activist, lawyer, and politician. A follower of Mahatma Gandhi, he is regarded as the father of the cooperative movement in India, most notably in the Kaira District Co-operative Milk Producers' Union in

1946, and the Anand Co-operative movement. Born on 22 October 1903, in Anand, Gujarat, to Kishibhai Patel, Tribhuvandas became a follower of Mahatma Gandhi and Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel during the Indian independence movement, and especially the civil disobedience movements, which led to his repeated imprisonment in 1930, 1935 and 1942. Death Anniversaries – Indian Personalities

Vithalbhai Jhaverbhai Patel (1873–1933): Vithalbhai Patel (27 September 1873 – 22 October 1933) was an Indian legislator and political leader, co-founder of the Swaraj Party and elder brother of Sardar Patel. Born in Nadiad, in the Indian state of Gujarat, Vithalbhai Jhaverbhai Patel was the third of five Patel brothers, two years elder to Vallabhbhai Patel, raised in the village of



Karamsad. According to Gordhanbhai Patel, a mistake on Vithalbhai's birthdate has crept into many modern accounts. His birthdate is clearly stated as 27 September 1873 on his last passport but the confusion

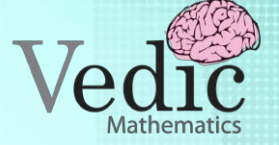

arose from obituary notices after his death listing it incorrectly as 18 February 1871. Based on that, he is only two years elder to his younger brother Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel

Jibanananda Das (1899–1954): (17 February 1899 – 22 October 1954) was an Indian poet, writer, novelist and



essayist in the Bengali language. Often called the Rupashi Banglar Kabi (lit. "Poet of Beautiful Bengal"), Das is the most well-known Bengali poet after Rabindranath Tagore and Kazi Nazrul Islam, although he was not well recognised during his

lifetime. Born in Barisal to a Bengali Hindu family, Das studied English literature at Presidency College, Kolkata, and earned his MA from Calcutta University. He often had trouble finding a stable job and suffered financial hardship throughout his life. He taught at several colleges but was never granted tenure. Following the partition of India, he permanently settled in Kolkata. Das died on 22 October 1954, eight days after being hit by a tramcar. Witnesses had later recounted that the tramcar had blown its whistle, but Das did not stop, and got struck. Some have also speculated the accident was suicide.

project at the time, was formally dedicated to the nation by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru. The project, built on the Sutlej River, is a major source of hydro-electric power and irrigation.

1947: Start of the First Kashmir War (Observed as J&K Black Day) October 22nd is observed in India as Jammu and Kashmir Black Day to commemorate the date in 1947 when Pakistani tribal invaders, supported by the Pakistani Army, launched an attack on the princely state of Jammu and Kashmir, which precipitated the first Indo-Pakistani War. This event is cited as a significant reason for the subsequent accession of the state to India.

2008: Chandrayaan-1 Launched India's first unmanned lunar exploration mission, Chandrayaan-1, was successfully launched by the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Sriharikota. The mission later famously detected the presence of water molecules on the Moon.

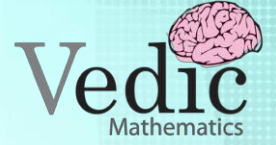

Cold War & Politics

1962: Cuban Missile Crisis

U.S. President John F. Kennedy publicly announced on television that American reconnaissance planes had discovered Soviet nuclear missile bases in Cuba.

He declared a naval "quarantine" (blockade) of Cuba to prevent further Soviet military shipments, pushing the world to the brink of nuclear war for several tense days.

1964: Jean-Paul Sartre Declines Nobel Prize FR

French philosopher and writer Jean-Paul Sartre was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature but became the first person to openly decline the award.

1936: End of the Long March in China CN

The grueling, 6,000-mile journey by the members of the Chinese Red Army led by Mao Zedong came to an end, marking a pivotal moment in the rise of the Communist Party.

1721: Peter the Great Proclaims Russian Empire RU

Following the Swedish defeat in the Great Northern War, Tsar Peter I proclaimed the establishment of the

Russian Empire, officially taking the title of "Emperor of All Russia."

Science & Technology

1884: Greenwich is Designated Prime Meridian

The International Meridian Conference in Washington, D.C., designated the meridian passing through the Royal Observatory in Greenwich, England, as the official Prime Meridian (0° longitude) for global timekeeping and cartography.

1975: Soviet Space Probe Lands on Venus

The Soviet unmanned space mission Venera 9 successfully landed on Venus and transmitted the first-ever images from the surface of another planet.

1797: First Recorded Parachute Jump FR

French balloonist André-Jacques Garnerin made the first recorded successful parachute jump from a hydrogen balloon about 3,300 feet (1,000 meters) above Paris.

Sports-related Historical Events In India

2016: India Wins Kabaddi World Cup: On this day, India defeated Iran in the final of the 2016 Kabaddi World Cup held in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, winning the tournament. India successfully defended its title, underscoring its dominance in the sport.

Sports-related Historical Events Internationally

2012: Lance Armstrong Stripped of Tour de France Titles

In one of the biggest doping scandals in cycling history, the International Cycling Union (UCI) announced its decision to uphold the findings of the US Anti-Doping Agency (USADA). Cyclist Lance Armstrong was officially

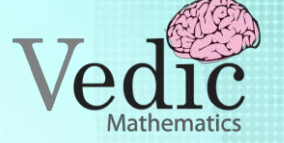

stripped of his seven Tour de France titles (1999–2005) and received a lifetime ban from the sport.

2000: Corey Dillon Sets NFL Rushing Record Cincinnati Bengals running back Corey Dillon set a then-NFL single-game rushing record with 278 yards against the Denver Broncos. This record stood for nine years.

1950: NFL High-Scoring Game The Los Angeles Rams defeated the Baltimore Colts with a score of 70-27, setting an NFL record for the most points scored in a regular-season game at the time.

1939: First Televised Professional Football Game NBC's experimental station W2XBS aired the first live televised professional football game. The Philadelphia Eagles played the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field, marking the debut of the sport on the small screen.

1878: First Rugby Match at Sale fort (UK) The first documented rugby match was played at Sale fort in England between Broughton and Swinton.
