Conservation Initiatives & Discoveries

Saudi Arabia's Terrestrial Biodiversity Study: Red Sea Global, a regenerative tourism developer, published the findings of a largescale terrestrial baseline survey in Saudi Arabia. The study, conducted in partnership with the University of Porto, identified several species potentially new to science, including a scorpion and two geckos. It also established 11 new local Key Biodiversity Areas (KBAs). The data will inform future conservation and land-use strategies, with a goal of achieving a 30% net conservation gain by 2040.

Tortoise Guardians in Nagaland: In a significant community-led conservation effort, youths were appointed as "tortoise guardians" to protect critically endangered Asian giant tortoises in Nagaland, India. Ten captive-bred tortoises were introduced to a community reserve, marking a major step toward recovering the wild population of this species, which plays a crucial role in seed dispersal.

New Species Discovered in India: The Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) and other research bodies announced the discovery of several new species across the country, including a new wolf spider from the Sundarbans, two bent-toed geckos in the Himalayas, and a new species of freshwater barb in Assam. These discoveries highlight the rich but fragile biodiversity of ecosystems.

Global Policy and Funding

Ocean Investment Protocol: The UN Global Compact and the UNEP Finance Initiative launched the 2025 Ocean Investment Protocol. This new framework aims to guide sustainable financing within the "blue economy" and is expected to influence investment decisions in over 60 countries, from fisheries to offshore renewable energy projects.

Global Biodiversity Framework Fund (GBFF): The Global Biodiversity Framework Fund (GBFF) is now operating at full speed, with several new projects approved and funded. A second call for proposals was announced, with a focus on Small Island Developing States and Least Developed Countries in its initial phase.

Species in the News

Primates at Risk: A new list of the 25 most threatened primates was published by the International Primatological Society, drawing attention to species at particularly high risk and aiming to inspire conservation action.






