Ashwini Vaishnaw Launches Qualcomm's This Advanced Chip In Bengaluru



In a landmark event on February 7, 2026, Union Minister Shri Ashwini Vaishnaw unveiled a cutting-edge 2 nm (nanometre) semiconductor chip design at Qualcomm's facility in Bengaluru. This milestone marks a pivotal shift for India, transitioning from a global back-office for tech support to a primary hub for high-end, end-to-end semiconductor engineering.

The launch is a centerpiece of the India Semiconductor Mission (ISM) 2.0, which specifically prioritizes indigenous design and deep-tech innovation.

Key Highlights of the Launch

- **Engineering Feat:** The 2 nm chip represents the current "frontier" of semiconductor technology. Each silicon wafer contains dies with approximately 20 to 30 billion transistors, a level of complexity the Minister compared to "writing the entire Mahabharata and Ramayana on a fingernail-sized chip."

- **End-to-End Design:** The entire lifecycle of this chip—from product definition and silicon design to **tape-out** (the final design stage before manufacturing) and validation—was executed by Qualcomm’s engineering teams in **Bengaluru, Chennai, and Hyderabad**.
- **Applications:** These chips are designed to power the next generation of **AI-enabled desktops**, edge devices, autonomous vehicles, and high-performance computing systems.

Minister's Vision: "The world is looking at India with hope. The next level of achievement will come from India... our priority is to create the next Qualcomm from within our startup ecosystem."

India Launches Nationwide Pulses Revolution from This Part In Country



This shift represents a strategic pivot in India's food security narrative. By launching the **Self-Reliance in Pulses Mission** from Amlaha, the government has signaled that the path to a "Viksit Bharat" (Developed India) runs directly through the fields of its pulse-growing heartlands.

The Amlaha Declaration: Field-Driven Policy

The choice of the **Food Legumes Research Centre (FLRP)** in Amlaha as the launchpad was symbolic. It transitioned policymaking from the offices of New Delhi to the agricultural research fields of Madhya Pradesh.

- **Holistic Dialogue:** For the first time, the "National Pulses Consultation" bridged the gap between stakeholders. It wasn't just ministers talking; it was a roundtable of **scientists, Seed Companies, Millers, and FPOs (Farmer Producer Organizations)**.
- **"Field-Driven, Not File-Driven":** Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan emphasized that policies would now be based on ground realities—soil health, seed quality, and market volatility—rather than just bureaucratic data.

Objectives of the Self-Reliance in Pulses Mission

India has historically been the world's largest consumer and importer of pulses (like Masur, Tur, and Urad). The 2026 Mission aims to flip this script through three main pillars:

- **High-Yielding Varieties:** Developing seeds that are climate-resilient and have shorter maturity cycles.
- **Seed Hubs:** Establishing localized seed production centers to ensure farmers have easy access to quality inputs.

2. Market & Price Security

- **Procurement Guarantees:** Ensuring that the Minimum Support Price (MSP) isn't just a paper figure but a realized profit for the farmer.
- **Direct Purchase:** Strengthening the role of NAFED and NCCF in purchasing directly from farmers to eliminate middlemen.

3. Sustainability (The "Yellow to Green" Shift)

- **Crop Diversification:** Encouraging farmers in water-stressed regions to switch from water-intensive crops (like paddy) to pulses, which naturally enrich soil nitrogen.

Impact on Global Trade

The mission's ultimate goal is to move India from a **Net Importer to a Net Exporter by 2030**.

PM Modi's Visit To Malaysia Sees India, Malaysia Ink Key Pacts on Trade and Energy



During Prime Minister Narendra Modi's two-day official visit to Kuala Lumpur on **February 7-8, 2026**, India and Malaysia dramatically elevated their **Comprehensive Strategic Partnership**.

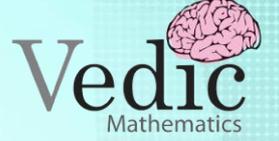
A major pillar of the visit was the push for **Local Currency Settlement (LCS)**.



BCCI Big Rewards Young U-19 World Cup Winner Over England

From April 2026, Banks Will Pay Deposit Insurance Premiums Based on Risk



Starting **April 1, 2026**, India will abandon its six-decade-old "flat-rate" deposit insurance system in favor of a **Risk-Based Premium (RBP)** framework. This landmark reform by the **Deposit Insurance and Credit Guarantee Corporation (DICGC)**, with RBI approval, ensures that a bank's insurance costs are directly proportional to its financial discipline and risk profile.

Historically, all banks paid a uniform **12 paise per ₹100** of deposits. The new system creates a tiered structure designed to end the "cross-subsidy" where well-managed banks effectively paid for the risks taken by weaker institutions.

The New Premium Structure

Banks will be classified into four risk categories (A, B, C, and D) based on their financial health, including capital adequacy, asset quality, and governance.

Risk Category	Risk Profile	New Premium Rate (per ₹100)	Change from Current Rate
Category A	Lowest Risk	8 Paise	33.3% Discount
Category B	Moderate Risk	10 Paise	16.7% Discount
Category C	High Risk	11 Paise	8.3% Discount

Confidentiality Note: To prevent "bank runs" or market panic, the specific risk rating (A-D) assigned to a bank will remain **strictly confidential** between the RBI/DICGC and the bank's top management. Banks are prohibited from using their "Category A" status for marketing.

The "Vintage Incentive"

A unique feature of the 2026 framework is the **Vintage Incentive**, rewarding long-term stability:

- Reward:** Eligible banks can receive an additional discount of **1% for every year** of satisfactory conduct.
- Cap:** This incentive is capped at a **maximum of 25%**.

- Eligibility:** Available to banks that have completed at least 25 years without any major distress events or restructuring.

What This Means for Depositors

While the way banks pay for insurance is changing, the protection for you remains the same:

- Coverage Limit:** Your deposits (Savings, FD, RD, Current) remain insured up to **₹5 lakh** per bank (including principal and interest).
- No Direct Cost:** The premium is paid entirely by the bank; there is no charge to the customer.
- Safety:** The reform makes the entire banking system more resilient by forcing riskier banks to either improve their health or pay higher costs to the insurance fund.

Implementation Details

- Scope:** Applies to all Scheduled Commercial Banks (SCBs), Regional Rural Banks (RRBs), and Cooperative Banks.
- Exclusions:** Payments Banks and Local Area Banks will continue to pay the flat 12-paise rate for now due to limited historical risk data.
- Review:** The DICGC will review and potentially recalibrate the RBP framework every **three years**.

The Monitoring Framework

To ensure that this isn't just a paper reform, the state has established high-powered **District-Level Committees**. The court specifically directed that these committees be headed by civilian authorities (Collectors) rather than police chiefs (SPs) to ensure impartial monitoring.

Committee Composition

Each district committee consists of **five members**:

- **Chairperson:** District Collector
- **Member 1:** District Revenue Officer (DRO)
- **Member 2:** An officer in the rank of DRO (nominated by the Collector)
- **Member 3:** Additional Superintendent of Police (AdSP - Headquarters)
- **Member 4:** Another AdSP-rank officer (handpicked by the Collector)

Key Distinction: By placing the Collector at the helm, the government has ensured that those who might benefit from the orderly system (senior police officials) are not the ones overseeing its abolition.

How the Abolition Will Be Enforced

The committees have been granted wide-ranging powers to identify and end the practice:

1. **Complaint Channels:** They are mandated to receive complaints from any person in any form—**oral, written, or electronic**. This allows whistleblowers within the force to report misuse anonymously.

Abolition of the Police Orderly System



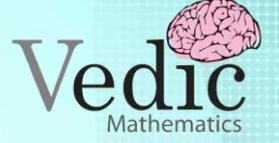
In a significant move to uphold the dignity of the police force, the **Tamil Nadu government** officially notified the Madras High Court on **February 5, 2026**, regarding a Government Order (G.O.) issued on **January 21, 2026**, to finally eradicate the colonial-era "**orderly system**."

This system, which involved deploying trained police personnel for the personal and domestic chores of senior officers, has been criticized by the court as "colonial slavery" that offends the constitutional right to dignity.

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- 2. Field Inspections:** Committees have the authority to conduct inspections and gather information on the ground.
- 3. Mandatory Reporting:** Reports on the status of abolition must be sent to the **Home Secretary every two months** (specifically before the 10th day of every odd month).
- 4. City-Specific Teams:** In major hubs like **Chennai, Coimbatore, and Madurai**, the Collectors will form multiple specialized teams to handle the larger density of high-ranking officials.

Consequences of Violation

The G.O. explicitly states that any police personnel found on "orderly duty" must be reassigned to regular police work immediately.

- Disciplinary Action:** If violations are reported, the **Additional Chief Secretary (Home)** is empowered to initiate departmental and disciplinary proceedings against the offending senior officials.
- Court Oversight:** The Madras High Court has adjourned the matter for four weeks to review the initial progress and ensure the first meetings are convened immediately.

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

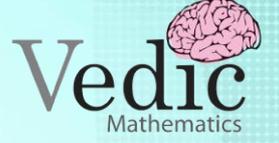



Dehradun's name is indeed a beautiful geographical and historical composite. To add more depth to your "Facts about Bharat" series, here is the full story of how this iconic valley city came to be:

The Etymology: "Camp in the Valley"

The name is essentially a 17th-century geographical coordinate:

- **Dehra:** A corruption of the word "Dera," meaning a camp, temporary settlement, or abode.
- **Dun:** A term in the local Garhwali and Sanskrit-derived dialects for a **longitudinal valley** that runs parallel to the mountain ranges. Geographically, "Duns" are unique valleys situated between the **Lesser Himalayas** (Middle Himalayas) and the **Shivalik Range** (Outer Himalayas).

The Historical Founder: Guru Ram Rai

The city's modern identity began in 1676.

- **The Exile:** Baba Ram Rai, the eldest son of the seventh Sikh Guru, **Guru Har Rai**, arrived in the valley after being excluded from the Sikh succession.

Geographical Significance

Dehradun is the largest and most famous of the "Duns." Unlike vertical river valleys, Doon valleys are wide and flat-bottomed.

- **Bounded by Rivers:** The valley is cradled between two of India's most sacred rivers—the **Ganga** to the east and the **Yamuna** to the west.
- **The Gateway:** Its position at the base of the mountains makes it the "Gateway to the Garhwal Himalayas," providing the starting point for journeys to Mussoorie, Chakrata, and the Char Dham shrines.

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
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
