

Sentence Improvement Words Theory and **MCQs** 

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In SBI Clerical Cadre (Phase-I) Examination 3-6 questions based on Sentence Improvement may be asked. In the questions based on Sentence Improvement or Phrase Substitution, a sentence is given with a part/ phrase printed in bold, italics or underlined. This part may or may not require improvement. Below the sentence are given four alternatives as a substitute for this part. The candidate is required to choose the alternative which makes the sentence grammatically correct. If the sentence is correct as it is and no correction is required, the candidate should choose the fifth alternative.

The purpose and nature of these questions are similar to those of questions based on spotting errors. For solving these questions you should have good knowledge of grammatical rules, appropriate use of idioms and phrases and superfluous expressions. The only advantage is that the candidate knows which part of the sentence is to be focused on.

# Rapid Clues

- First, read the sentence and understand its meaning.
- Now focus on the part which is to be improved.
- Try to find out the error in this part in the context of the whole sentence.
- Look for the inappropriate and superfluous words.
- There may be error in the use of phrasal verbs or idioms and phrases.
- Read all the answer choices before selecting the answer.
- The sentence may not require any improvement. So don't make an extra effort to find the error.
